PRELIMINARY PROGRAM

This brochure contains information about the approximately 200 invited speaker sessions to be held at DDW 2008. Programming is developed and sponsored by the DDW societies—AASLD, AGA Institute, ASGE and SSAT. Sessions can be sponsored by a single society or by several societies acting in collaboration. Each society contributes program content unique to its specialty, resulting in a diverse and highly topical program. Program information is organized as follows:

New in 2008: For details about the final program, including information about oral and poster abstract presentations and specific room assignments, you can refer to the My DDW personal meeting planner, an online tool that will be available at www.ddw.org starting in March 2008 and accessible onsite via computer terminals. The My DDW personal meeting planner enables you to easily search the complete DDW program and develop a meeting itinerary (see page 46 for more details). You can also refer to the printed DDW Program Book, which will be available onsite. An Abstracts on Disk CD-ROM, containing accepted abstracts only, will be mailed to registrants who register by April 25, 2008.

Register Early—Save Money and Secure Housing

- Individuals who register after April 25, 2008 must pick up their registration materials onsite.

CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION

CME credit is available for most of the DDW sessions. Each of the DDW sponsoring societies will be certifying their activities for CME credit. Refer to the DDW Program Book onsite for details of which sessions carry CME credit. Computer terminals dedicated to CME credit processing will be available onsite. Most DDW sessions are included in your DDW registration fee. Some sessions have additional fees and require separate registration using the Registration and Housing Form. Ticketed sessions are very popular and do sell out, so register early.

Housing Deposits and Cancellations

All hotel reservations require a deposit via credit card or check payment. The check must be drawn from a U.S. bank and be made out to DDW Registration and Housing. 


VISA REQUIREMENTS










ELASTOGRAPHY FOR DIAGNOSING LIVER FIBROSIS AND PORTAL HYPERTENSION

The diagnosis of liver fibrosis is constantly shifting with the development of novel methods to non-invasively assess its prescence including serological assays and new technologies. Measurement of liver stiffness, as detected by elastography, has become an important clinical and research tool for the measurement of liver fibrosis. The diagnosis of advanced fibrosis/cirrhosis is an important step in the evaluation of patients with liver disease, since these patients should be screened for portal hypertension and hepatocellular carcinoma. This symposium will examine how elastography can differentiate mild fibrosis from advanced fibrosis and how liver stiffness correlates with both portal pressure and esophageal varices. The role of liver stiffness as a tool in the diagnosis and monitoring of liver patients will be clarified.

The Goals and Objectives of this session are to:

- Understand the pathophysiologic basis of fibrosis and portal hypertension, and how non-invasive techniques such as elastography may detect these processes;
- > Illustrate the optimal use of elastography in clinical practice;
- > Understand the correlation between liver stiffness and liver fibrosis and the potential diagnostic use of liver stiffness, alone and in combination with serological biomarkers; and
- Identify the relationships between liver stiffness and portal hypertension and how to utilize this test for variceal screening.

EXTRACORPOREAL ALBUMIN DIALYSIS FOR LIVER FAILURE

Albumin-based dialysis systems are increasingly used for treating both acute and chronic liver failure. There is an increasing number of patients presenting to our offices with cirrhosis. Refractory ascites is a consequence of advanced liver disease, and impacts quality of life, morbidity and mortality. The presence of refractory ascites is not directly reflected in the MELD score.

The therapeutic armamentarium is growing for refractory ascites, but successful treatment requires an understanding of the pathophysiology that leads its development. This session is essential to better care for the growing cohort of our patients with refractory ascites.

The Goals and Objectives of this session are to:

- Understand the pathophysiology of the development of refractory ascites;
- Define the clinical impact of refractory ascites on quality of life, morbidity and mortality; and
- > Understand current and future therapies for refractory ascites.

HCV TREATMENT IN PATIENTS WITH RENAL FAILURE

HCV infection remains prevalent in patients on chronic hemodialysis as well as in renal transplant candidates. This session will provide a practical approach to the evaluation and management of these patients and will emphasize the consequences of HCV infection in renal transplant recipients, including progression of liver disease, renal graft dysfunction and post-transplant diabetes mellitus. The role of antiviral therapy pre- and postrenal transplant will be discussed.

- Assess the implications of HCV infection in renal transplant candidates;
- > Identify candidates for antiviral therapy in the chronic kidney disease population; and

THE CHANGING FACE OF HEPATITIS B AS A RESULT OF POPULATION MIGRATION

Hepatitis B virus can be classified into 8 genotypes. Certain HBV genotypes have been shown to correlate with more rapid progression to cirrhosis and liver cancer. Global distribution of HBV genotypes may be traced to population migration and may account for variations in patterns of HBV-related liver disease in different parts of the world. Implementation of universal vaccination of newborns and catch-up vaccination of children and adolescents has resulted in a significant decrease in the incidence of acute HBV infection in the United States, but the prevalence of chronic HBV infection is largely unchanged due to immigration from HBV-endemic areas. This paradox has led to new CDC recommendations on HBV screening. Immigration as the predominant source of chronic HBV infection in the U.S. has also resulted in changes in disease patterns that necessitate adaptations in management strategies.
